LEVEL I TRAINER

1. The applicant must be a regular member of the USPCA in good standing. The applicant must have been a full time police patrol handler or patrol trainer for a minimum of five years, and must have graduated from a police patrol canine course. (Include copy of the certificate)
2. The training course that is offered by their agency, for the training of working police patrol dogs and handlers, must consist of a minimum of 10 (Ten) full time consecutive weeks or equivalent. This course must conform to the USPCA Standards of Patrol Dogs, PD I. (Include copy of training course & lesson plan).
3. Dogs trained must be trained to the following standards; on and off lead obedience, agility, scent work (building search, article, tracking and area search) and criminal apprehension and must conform to the standards set by the USPCA.
4. The applicant must be assigned trainers duties for his/hers law enforcement agency. Applicant must submit a current letter from the Chief, Sheriff, CEO or his/her designee describing same on Department Letterhead only. If more than one trainer is claiming the same team(s) then the K9 unit supervisor, for the agency hosting the K9 course, must submit a letter on department letterhead confirming that all listed trainers were equally involved in the training (full time) of the claimed teams.
5. The applicant must have trained five (5) police patrol teams (handler and dog). The applicant may not be included as one of these teams. A minimum of two (2) of these five (5) teams must have obtained a PD I in a sanctioned Regional or District Certification, verifiable by national records. All teams must submit a notarized and signed K9 survey form.
6. The application must be presented to an Active Nationally Certified Chief Judge for approval and comments.
7. The application must then be submitted with all supporting documents to their Region or District Executive Board for approval or disapproval. The application must be signed by the president, and one other member of the executive board. The application must be sent by the Regional or District Board, if approved, to the Trainers Certification Committee Chairman 60 days prior to the upcoming meeting, no exceptions. After certificate is issued, the approved application packet will be forwarded to the National Executive Director for record retention.
8. If certification is not approved, the applicant must be notified within 30 days by the Trainers Certification Committee Chairman, with the reason for the denial. If approved, the applicant will receive a certificate of certification.
9. Accreditation can be revoked or removed at anytime by the Association for just cause after a full investigation by the Trainers Committee and a hearing of the National Executive Board of the USPCA. The Trainers Certification Committee can review certifications and make any necessary recommendations.
10. Certification cannot be used to promote personal gain to the general public.

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LEVEL II TRAINER

1. The applicant must be a regular member of the USPCA in good standing. The applicant must have been a full time police patrol handler or patrol/detector trainer for a minimum of ten years, and must have graduated from a police patrol canine course. (Include copy of the certificate)
2. Applicant must meet the qualifications of Level 1 Trainer and have held the certification of a Level 1 Trainer for a minimum of one (1) year.
3. The training course that is offered by their agency, for the training of working police patrol dogs and handlers, must consist of minimum of 10 (Ten) full time consecutive weeks or equivalent. This course must conform to the USPCA Standards of Patrol Dogs, PD I. (Include copy of training course & lesson plan).
4. The applicant must be assigned trainers duties for his/hers law enforcement agency. Applicant must submit a current letter from the Chief, Sheriff, CEO or his/her designee describing same on Department Letterhead only. If more than one trainer is claiming the same team(s) then the K9 unit supervisor, for the agency hosting the K9 course, must submit a letter on department letterhead confirming that all listed trainers were equally involved in the training (full time) of the claimed teams.
5. The applicant must have trained at least five law enforcement canine teams. A minimum of two (2) of these five must have obtained a PD I, in a sanctioned Regional Trial. One (1) of the teams must have reached proficiency as Detector Dog and one (1) must have reached proficiency in a PD II according to the standards of the USPCA. Certifications must be verifiable by national office records. (The applicant cannot be considered as one of these teams). All teams must submit a notarized and signed K9 survey form.
6. The application must be presented to an Active Nationally Certified Chief Judge for approval and comments.
7. The application must then be submitted with all supporting documents to their Region or District Executive Board for approval or disapproval. The application must be signed by the president, and one other member of the executive board. The application must be sent by the Regional or District Board, if approved, to the Trainers Certification Committee Chairman 60 days prior to the upcoming meeting, no exceptions. After certificate is issued, the approved application packet will be forwarded to the National Executive Director for record retention.
8. If certification is not approved, the applicant must be notified within 30 days by the Trainers Certification Committee Chairman, with the reason for the denial. If approved, the applicant will receive a certificate of certification.
9. Accreditation can be revoked or removed at anytime by the Association for just cause after a full investigation by the Trainers Committee and a hearing of the National Executive Board of the USPCA. The Trainers Certification Committee can review certifications and make any necessary recommendations.
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LEVEL III TRAINER

1. Applicant must be a regular member of the USPCA, in good standing meeting all the qualifications of Level I and Level II Trainer. Applicant must have held a Level II certification for a minimum of one (1) year. The applicant must have been a full time patrol trainer and/ or patrol handler for a minimum of fifteen years
2. The applicant must be assigned trainers duties for his/hers law enforcement agency and must submit a current letter from the Chief, Sheriff, CEO or his/her designee describing same on Department Letterhead only.
3. Applicant must be a Nationally Certified USPCA PDI Judge.
4. The application must be presented to an Active Nationally Certified Chief Judge for approval and comments.
5. The application must then be submitted with all supporting documents to their Region or District Executive Board for approval or disapproval. The application must be signed by the president, and one other member of the executive board. The application must be sent by the Regional or District Board, if approved, to the Trainers Certification Committee Chairman 60 days prior to the upcoming meeting. No exceptions.
6. After certificate is issued, the approved application packet will be forwarded to the National Executive Director for record retention.
7. The accredited certification may be removed or revoked at anytime by the Association for just cause after a full investigation by the Trainers Committee and a hearing of the Executive Board of the USPCA. The Trainers Certification Committee can review all certifications and make necessary recommendations.
8. Certification can not be used to promote personal gain to the general public.

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
